

# A Moment, Gathering, Wonder, and Gratitude:

# **A Moment**

Would you join me for a moment on the Buckeye Trail? It's finally Fall, and the blue blazes are calling us to follow them.

Meandering along a favorite day hike through crisp leaves and ankle twisting acorns, Summer's humidity subsided, the angle of light through the changing forest canopy makes this same stretch a different trail experience than last time. My shoulders are a little sore from carrying my pack and I'm ready for a trail-side snack, including a Pawpaw picked right off the tree. It's time for a break, about halfway through my hike, my favorite part of the whole experience. I like to sit in a pretty place in the middle of nowhere, think or not think, but listen and look, and wonder where I am, where those I care about are, and where I'm going. I pull out my map to see how far and how fast or slow I've gone, and what's around me beyond the creeks, hills, or forest, I get my bearings, stand in the place where I live, think about direction, wonder why I haven't before, and plan for what's next.

It's a moment of peace and grounding. It's a moment of anticipation and awe, of a thunderstorm building or the cry

of a Red-tailed hawk. It brings me joy. Now that I'm here the only regret I could have is who I have not brought along with me to share the moment, and now how to share the experience to let them know I was thinking about them.

# **Gathering**

Who else is sharing a Buckeye Trail experience with me all along the BT in their way in this moment? Some gather to celebrate the Buckeye Trail Association at Buckeye TrailFest on the shore of Lake Erie at Maumee Bay, thanks to the Lake Plains Chapter, or together with our larger community at Five

Rivers Metroparks Experience Outdoor with 20,000 friends. Some are exploring the forested lakeside at the BTA's Beall Farmstead looking for and learning about wild mushrooms at the Muskingum Lakes Chapter's Fall Mushroom Camp, or identifying a new them milkweed partially eaten by Monarch caterpillars, gathering for their journey south. Others are challenging

themselves through the rugged hills of the Wayne National Forest at the Little Cities of the Forest Chapter's Blue Blaze Festival trail runs or completing the Crooked River Chapter's Little Loop Challenge together. Some are getting to know each other by celebrating the love of the Buckeye Trail they have in common like the Appalachian Foothills Chapter members have organized with the Buckeye Trail Town community of Peebles near Serpent Mound.

#### Wonder

Sitting on the side of the trail, watching hikers walk by, they're adjusting straps and saying hi, taking strides. I wonder if 700+ miles away on the other side of Ohio someone is completing the Buckeye Trail for the first time, if Richard Morgan and a BTA Circuit Hike will come around the bend towards me on his 6th or 7th time around, or if the next Ian Koenig will pass me up on our next Fastest Known Time. I wonder, if the stories are true, what would be the best habitat for the Ohio Grassman / Bigfoot around here, and what would a bobcat or bear think of them. I wonder if ahead I'll bump into experienced Buckeye Trail volunteers or our partners Boots on the Trail veterans training our next generation on how to properly dig a trail tread out the side of a hill.

So much is possible on this one trail in one moment, I'm filled with gratitude and excitement for the possibilities. I'm thankful to all our partners that helped to preserve, create, and steward this landscape for me to traverse and for all the preservation projects to come. I'm thankful for the generations of those that created and maintain this trail tread to experience and for the miles left for us to build. I'm thankful for the volunteers that put this map as a guide in my hand and for the those that are creating our 2026-2030 BTA Strategic Plan to guide us through tomorrow. I'm grateful for those that have completed their commitment to the BTA like a BT completionist leading us to today, such as Trustees Emeriti; Stephen Walker, Erik Morris, and Randall Roberts, but also for the message from a family looking for our Backpacking 101 for their first adventure like the newly elected Trustees and Officers that have raised their hands to lead the BTA through tomorrow. I'm grateful for volunteer leaders that have gathered us together, like the TrailFest 2025 Team of Dane Miles, Valerie Gardner, Lena Dockery, and Sunny Sunyak, and for those coming together to

plan TrailFest 2026 at Salt Fork State Park with our friends of the North Country Trail Association and Outdoor Recreation Council of Appalachia.

I'm grateful that, thanks to the love of the idea of a Buckeye Trail, we are all able to share at least one thing in common, providing us with the opportunity for our own kind of joy, or satisfaction in a job well done. Thank you for putting whatever you can into the BTA so that we can all find our joy out on the Trail.





# Origin of your Trail Name:

My trail name is Coffee Hunter. It started when I was hiking along the Buckeye Trail. I'd spot coffee shops along the way and make sure to stop and grab a cup. But if I was hiking in an area without a coffee shop, I'd bring an emergency coffee with me. Usually, it was a bottled Starbucks Frappuccino Iced Coffee.

# When did you hike the Buckeye Trail?

I started section hiking the Buckeye Trail on February 18, 2023 in the Defiance section. I finished the trail on April 13, 2025 in the Massillon section.

# **Trail Story:**

My son graduated from high school and enlisted in the Marines, so I started hiking the Buckeye Trail. It was a way for me to process the emotions of becoming an empty nester. My first hike was by chance when I signed up for the Metroparks Toledo event Wintering the Towpath. I hiked from Providence Metropark to Bend View Metropark in the Defiance section. After

the hike, I got a business card that said I had hiked 5 miles on the Buckeye Trail. That really piqued my interest, and in the first year, I mostly explored the Defiance section and parts of the Akron section that went through Cuyahoga National Park.

The second year I started exploring the trail further and meeting fellow hikers. It was an incredible journey filled with new experiences that kept drawing me back.

I've faced all sorts of weather conditions on the trail, from freezing temperatures and biting winds to severe storms and scorching heat. I've witnessed the stunning terrain change from vast plains to rolling hills and picturesque river valleys. I've hiked through glaciated areas with their rounded hills, contrasting with unglaciated areas with their steeper and rockier terrain. Along the way, I've been blessed with breathtaking sunrises, majestic arches, caves, intricate rock formations, and towering cliffs.

In addition to the physical challenges, I've also taken a walking history tour of Ohio, exploring the state's rich heritage, including the birthplace of aviation, canals, earthworks, and key sites from the War of 1812.



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
# Trail Story Continued:

# **Loveland Section**






# **Belle Valley Section**


# Strange things are afoot in the Buckeye State.



 ${f L}$ eap into Ohio's cryptid lore with these quick no-bake energy bites, inspired by the legendary Loveland Frogman—a humanoid amphibian spotted along the Little Miami River—and The Ohio River Chapter Patch, from Pat Log symbolizing the region's mysterious waterways. Greentinted for that slimy glow, they're packed with protein and quick energy for swampy hikes, fitting snugly in your pack

# Ingredients (Makes 12 Bite):

- 1 cup rolled oats
- ½ cup almond butter
- ¼ cup honey
- 1/3 cup dried cranberries

- ¼ cup pumpkin seeds
- ½ tsp matcha powder (for green "frog"
- Pinch of sea salt

- Mix oats, almond butter, honey, cranberries, seeds, matcha, and salt in a bowl until sticky.
- 2. Roll into 12 golf-ball-sized bites; chill in fridge for 30 minutes to firm.

- Fuel for Loveland trails—watch for frog-like shadows!








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# 12th Annual Buckeye TrailFest 2025 A Review....



# A Buckeye Trail Celebration at Maumee Bay State Park Valerie Gardner

This September, the BuckeyeTrail community gathered for the 12th Annual TrailFest, hosted for the first time on the shores of Lake Erie at Maumee Bay State Park. Over the course of the weekend, 150 attendees joined in hikes, programs, and campfires that celebrated the Buckeye Trail and the landscapes of Northwest Ohio.

# Friday Fun: Wetlands and Wildlife

The weekend began with Friday Fun activities, which drew more than 80 participants to two of Northwest Ohio's premier natural areas: Magee Marsh Wildlife Area and the Ottawa National Wildlife Refuge.

At Magee Marsh, visitors witnessed live bird banding demonstrations, toured the recently renovated visitor center, and explored exhibits that showcase more than 150 species of Ohio's migratory birds. Others climbed aboard open-air trams for guided tours of Ottawa NWR, where federal and state staff—supported by 16 volunteers—brought the story of the Great Black Swamp to life.

The day also included a bit of trail magic. Strong winds drained the shallow section of Lake Erie where the paddle

excursion was planned, making it unsafe to launch. Thanks to quick teamwork, the paddle was relocated to Magee Marsh, where participants still got time on the water and a firsthand look at how wetlands sustain both wildlife and people.

By evening, everyone gathered back at Maumee Bay Lodge for the official kickoff. The Meet & Greet in the Icebreaker Lounge set the tone with handshakes and hugs, while the first campfire at the lodge's ring gave new friends and longtime hikers a chance to swap stories under the stars.





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# Saturday: Programs, Hikes, and Inspiration

Saturday showcased the incredible diversity of the Buckeye Trail community. With 27 volunteer speakers leading sessions throughout the day, there was something for everyone to enjoy.

The morning featured talks on the National Trails System with the North Country Trail Association, local history with Heritage Sylvania, and wetland community building with Mad Scientist Associates. Naturalists from the Maumee Bay Nature Center guided birding hikes along the lakeshore, while others invited participants to dip nets into ponds for a macroinvertebrate study.

One milestone moment came from the Great Lakes Fishery Commission, marking the first time an internationally funded agency had presented at TrailFest. Their session on invasive sea lampreys, complete with live specimens, highlighted the international cooperation required to protect Great Lakes ecosystems across U.S., Canadian, and Tribal Nations.

Afternoon sessions broadened the scope even further. Participants learned about potential new Trail Towns identified through GIS research, trained in building endurance for hiking, and got a deep dive into Ohio's past in "History of Ohio Along the Trail." Meanwhile, naturalists introduced kids and families to snakes, turtles, and frogs during a lively Creature Feature.

Not all learning happened indoors. The Inland Lake Trail offered a 4.8-mile loop around Maumee Bay, while the 3.2-mile Boardwalk Trail showcased Lake Erie wetlands from an ADA-accessible wooden walkway. Families loved the half-mile Storybook Trail, which wound through a meadow filled with milkweed and pollinators.

# Saturday Evening: Awards, Animals, and Auction Wins

As the sun set over Lake Erie, the TrailFest community gathered for a packed evening program. ODNR Director Mary Mertz delivered the welcome address, offering insights into Ohio's natural resources and sharing one unforgettable statistic: the Ohio Department of Natural Resources maintains 1,400 bathrooms across the state—a number that drew both laughter and admiration.

The keynote presentation came from Back to the Wild, a wildlife rehabilitation and education center. Their team introduced audiences to live animal ambassadors, including a tortoise, owls, and even raptors that soared just overhead. The program emphasized the importance of preserving native habitats and offered participants the rare opportunity to connect eye-to-eye with wild creatures.

Recognition followed inspiration as the Buckeye Trail Association honored those who give so much of their time and energy. Twenty-eight Volunteer Awards were presented, celebrating the trail maintainers, hike leaders, committee members, and behind-the-scenes helpers who keep Ohio's longest footpath alive and well.

The evening also marked a milestone for the Buckeye Trail Completionist community. Seventeen hikers in the Class of 2025 were honored for finishing the 1,444-mile trail. This class set records, including: 11 women, the largest number of female finishers in a single year, 2 women who completed the Buckeye Trail for the third time, and the second woman from Michigan to finish the trail.

The room erupted in applause for each name called, as Completionists were celebrated not just for their miles, but for their dedication, resilience, and passion for the Buckeye Trail.

The evening closed with the always-anticipated silent auction. Chapters donated 47 lots, ranging from handcrafted items to trail gear, raising \$2,300 for the Buckeye Trail Association. As winning bids were announced, cheers filled the room, and attendees left with both treasures and the knowledge that their generosity would support the trail.

The night ended, as it began, around the campfire. Beneath the glow of the stars, conversations and laughter continued late, echoing the bonds that form whenever the Buckeye Trail community gathers.

# **Sunday: Reflection and Renewal**

Sunday morning provided an opportunity to slow down. CW Spencer led a non-denominational service, providing space for



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reflection and gratitude. The weekend concluded with the BTA's Annual Membership Meeting and Board of Trustees session, where members heard updates on the state of the trail and looked ahead to future initiatives.

#### **A Team Effort**

TrailFest 2025 would not have been possible without the extraordinary efforts of the Lake Plains Chapter TrailFest team—Lena Dockery, Valerie Gardner, Dane Miles, and James "Sunny" Sunyak—along with dozens of additional volunteers. From hike leaders to registration staff, from silent auction organizers to behind-the-scenes planners, each contribution made the weekend seamless and memorable.

# **Looking Ahead**

From four live animal encounters to a record-breaking class of Completionists, TrailFest 2025 at Maumee Bay was filled with moments that will be remembered for years to come. It showcased not only the natural beauty of Northwest Ohio but also the strength of the Buckeye Trail community.



As attendees departed, many carried with them memories of bird calls along the boardwalk, lessons from expert presenters, and laughter around the campfire. More importantly, they left with renewed energy to keep the blue blazes shining across Ohio.

TrailFest 2025 proved once again that the Buckeye Trail is more than a footpath—it is a living expression of connection between people, places, and purpose. As we look forward to TrailFest 2026 at Salt Fork State Park, we carry with us the spirit of Maumee Bay: wetlands alive with birds, stories shared by firelight, and a community committed to the journey.



# "When Grandma Gatewood Took a Hike"

Many of us 'mid-century modern' folks must field questions from grandchildren or young friends as to "Why?" such an "old" person like

Grandma or Grandpa or Auntie Jane would think that they could "still" undertake activities like hiking! After all, we're SOOOOO old! (At least to your average youngster!)

"When Grandma Gatewood Took a Hike" is a lovely, illustrated book that even those not-so-old can share with children and grandchildren to not only highlight Grandma Gatewood's exploits on the Appalachian Trail but also to demonstrate that people of all ages can and do enjoy the outdoors. Recommended for ages 4 to 10 years old, all can enjoy the soft-focused illustrations and compelling story.

A "School Library Journal" Best Picture Book of 2016, Houts has included a photograph of Grandma Gatewood as well as source notes and additional history about her life. Don't miss the references to the Grandma Gatewood Trail in the Hocking Hills in the section "Grandma Hiked On" ... this might just be the information that would encourage your young friend to want to join you on a hike there.

And who knows where that first hike might lead? (Might I suggest more of the Buckeye Trail?")

Children ages 4–10 will delight in this narrative nonfiction work as they accompany Emma Gatewood on the adventure of a lifetime and witness her transformation from grandmother to hiking legend, becoming "Grandma" to all. -- Ohio University Press.

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# Tales from the trail: Lost on Ohio's Buckeye Trail—And Found by Us

The cry was so faint we almost missed it. Somewhere in the brush, a high, thin mewling cut through the rustle of leaves. We froze mid-step on the Buckeye Trail.

Then it came again—desperate, insistent.

Roxanna spotted it first. "There," she whispered, pointing toward a shallow trench. Out of the tangle of weeds emerged a scrap of orange fur, all ribs and wide eyes.

She tore off a corner of her ham sandwich and tossed it gently. The kitten sniffed, inched forward, and devoured it like he hadn't eaten in days.

"We'll mark the spot," Roxanna said, nodding toward a yellow road sign visible through the trees. "When we get back to the car, we'll see if there's a farmhouse nearby."

As we hiked on, that tiny face wouldn't leave my mind. It wasn't the first time a cat tugged at my heart. In fact, my life has been punctuated by feline rescues—each one arriving at moments of upheaval or transformation.

# A Life of Rescues:

Back in the '80s and '90s, when my children were young, cats always seemed to find us. My son Ramon had a knack for saving injured or neglected ones, a gift my twins quietly inherited after he left for California.

One day, neighbors asked if an orange stray was ours. I said no—unaware my twins had been feeding him. Soon, he was at our door every morning. His size earned him the name Brutus. A year later, a tabby digging through our garbage became Lady Cat. She was affectionate, just when I needed it most.

When my twins graduated in 2004, I divorced my husband and moved to Columbus, cats in tow. Money and time were tight, but my oldest son helped. Brutus and Lady Cat were aging, but they were my constant thread.

In 2008, Dave came into my life. He loved me, but not my cats. Complaints about cat hair in food and phantom smells became routine. When their health failed in 2014 and 2018, I made the painful decision to

euthanize them. I cried harder than I had at most funerals.

Life without cats was simpler. No vet bills, no litter boxes, no friction with Dave. I thought that chapter was closed. The Buckeye Trail had other plans.

# Back to October 27, 2024:

When we reached Roxanna's car, there were no farms or houses nearby. The kitten had almost certainly been dumped.

We drove back to the road sign where we'd seen him. Roxanna's

husband is severely allergic, so she couldn't take him. Dave surprised me: "Let's bushwhack to the trail and see if he's still there."

The mewling guided us straight to him. I hesitated to pick him up, so Dave did. The kitten burrowed into his jacket, purring.

We still had miles left to hike, and on Sunday, none of the animal shelters were open, so I said I'd contact my friend who works for

the Humane Society on Monday. So, we bought a carrier and food. Roxanna, ever resourceful, made a water bowl from her bottle and a tiny harness from spare cord so he could pee. "A coyote would have gotten him," she said. "Let's call him Blaze in honor of the Buckeye Trail."

Before the next leg of our hike, we left the cat in the carrier inside our car, cracked the windows, and continued on the trail. But all I could think about was the kitten. Should I take him to the shelter? If I wanted to keep him, would Dave complain?

After our hike, Dave drove, and I let Blaze out of the carrier. He swatted my ponytail, licked my hand, purred, and curled up asleep in my lap. With each swat of his tiny paw and each purr that rumbled from his chest, I knew I couldn't give him up.

# **Dave's Change of Heart:**

On the way home, Dave bought a litter pan and litter.

When we arrived home, we set the litter pan and carrier in the bathroom. I was dumbfounded when Dave picked up the kitten, stroked him, and then said, "We need some cat toys."

I thought he hated cats. Did Dave have a change of heart? I doubted it.

The next day, I asked my friend who works for the Humane Society what to do. She told me drop-offs require an appointment and fee, and the shelter was already full. "Tell Dave it's not that easy."

So, I did. I told Dave I'd take the kitten to the vet on Tuesday to get him checked out.

When the vet announced, "It's a boy—about nine weeks old," I texted Dave. He replied, "I finally got a boy!" Did that mean we were keeping the kitten?

That night, to my amazement, a package of cat toys arrived. Dave scooped Blaze into his arms and asked, "What else do we need?" I smiled. Maybe rescuing Blaze had rescued something in him, too.

How lucky we were to be hiking that stretch of the Buckeye Trail on that day, at that hour. It brought us the joy of unexpected companionship and the fulfillment of a rescue mission. The Buckeye Trail is full of surprises—and sometimes gives you more than you ever asked for.

# **Epilogue: Boys Will Be Boys**

Blaze turned out to be a whirlwind: digging in flowerpots, scratching my recliner, splashing in the toilet, and climbing the Christmas tree to knock ornaments—especially a felt angel—onto the floor.

Dave bonded with him instantly. As a boy, he'd been just as mischievous—climbing roofs, dismantling clocks, pouring water into a car's gas tank. Blaze's curiosity felt familiar. When Blaze darts outside, Dave takes him to climb our weeping cherry, recalling how his grandmother once tried to keep him grounded by cutting the lower branches. It didn't work on him either.

By August 2025, Blaze had grown from a two-pound scrap to a twelve-pound bruiser. He and Dave play tug-bag, peek-a-boo, and "tree time." Oddly enough, Dave now spends more time with him than I do.

# **Rescue Kitten: The Sequel**

When friends said Blaze needed a playmate, Dave resisted. Then fellow Buckeye Trail hiker Kim persuaded us to adopt a gray kitten born to a feral mother—too affectionate to be released back into the wild.

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My oldest son, who often visits with my granddaughter, has always been a devoted cat lover, laughing hysterically at cat videos, which his daughter viewed with disdain. Still, she asked to hold and play with the affectionate gray cat, and suggested we name him Cosmo. Would wonders ever cease?

But there was still the question: Would Blaze accept Cosmo? At first, Blaze was wary and puzzled, but after a week, he was

eager to play-fight, a skill Cosmo had taught him. It's especially comical when Cosmo, the scrappy three-pound undercat, pounces on the Blazin' Beast. Cosmo can be stealthy, striking when least expected—during nap time.

They now share the window seat, the cat tower, food, and toys--but they wrestle for possession of the Christmas angel.

Years ago, I said goodbye to my last cats and thought that chapter of my life was closed. But the Buckeye Trail had other plans. On one hike, it gave us Blaze. Soon after, it nudged us

toward Cosmo. Now, our house is filled again with the sound of paws racing down the hall-and reminder that rescues work both ways.

The Buckeye Trail is full of surprises, and sometimes the most remarkable treasures you find aren't on the map.

# Ohio's Gems Anthony Small Rural Action

# Tall Green Milkweed (Asclepias hirtella)

No one can deny that this growing season has been a wet one. Looking back to spring, large swaths of rain would frequently sweep throughout Southeast Ohio. Water was abundant and there seemed to be more than enough to share across all of the towns. On occasion large rain showers would dump inches of rain within minutes. This would often escalate into overflowing waterways and frequent flash floods. At those times, sheets of water would flow across the landscape. It's been a great year for those of us who don't enjoy hand-watering their gardens. However, It's been an unfortunate year for many local growers. Water

saturated soils drowned plants and encouraged the growth of harmful fungus that would damage the roots of crops.

As I reflect, it seems that the wildlife benefited the most from this year's growing season. Nature this year seemed to be making up for last year's debt. In June, roadsides exploded with beautiful white umbels on elderberry bushes. In July Spicebush promised a twofold harvest of berries to come in the Fall. Now in August I see tall stands of ironweed, trumpetweed and milkweed overtaking roadsides. One of the milkweed species I am seeing a lot of is a bit of an uncommon one; Tall Green Milkweed (Asclepias hirtella).

It's often considered a subspecies of the Longleaf Milkweed (Asclepias longifolia). The main difference between the two is that the subspecies often produces more flowers with larger inflorescences. It's considered uncommon across much of its range and In Ohio it's known to be most abundant in the Southeast portion of the state. It prefers growing in grasslands and hayfields in full sun with good quality soils. This year I have found it growing in various hayfields around Albany, OH. I believe this year it has exploded in growth with many individuals towering well above the tall fescue. The monarch butterflies have surely appreciated this year's growth as Tall Green Milkweed is a preferred host plant for monarch caterpillars.

# **Pets On The Trail**

sure to include all of the essentials like snacks, water, and waste bags. But what about first aid? And how does this apply to our pets?


# **Building a Pet First Aid Kit**

I spoke to Dr. Jesyrae Lawther, a veterinarian in Athens, Ohio, who suggests having a pet-specific first aid kit for any emergencies that may arise while out on trail. "I also advise clients to take a canine CPR/first aid class as well, to be sure they are prepared to perform it properly if needed." The American Red Cross offers courses for pet first aide/CPR.

Putting a first aid kit together for your pet isn't as daunting as it may seem. Many of the items suggested for these kits are already present in your own kit, so there won't be a lot of extra items for you to add. However, keeping items like a nylon leash and a muzzle will come in handy in many cases.

# **Sharing the Trail with Loved Ones**



Have a list of veterinarians that are located near the section that you are hiking before you head out. Buckeye Trail Chapters will be familiar with their section and could help you find information for veterinarians in the area so you have the contacts that you need before your hike begins.

Being sure that you have a way to carry your pet, should the need arise, is an important practice, too. Making a sling and training your pet to be carried in it will make hauling them out of the woods easier on you both. Slings can be made from most items that you may already be carrying. A shirt, a jacket, or even your backpack may work in an emergency. Also be aware that the Buckeye Trail does go through some private properties that may have animals of their own. Keeping furry hikers on a leash will increase their safety, and the safety of those that you may encounter on your adventure.

# **Peebles Trail Town Celebration**

**Description:** The Buckeye Trail Association will welcome Peebles OH as the 22nd Buckeye Trail Town on Oct. 1,2025 at 11:00AM at a celebration in McCoy Park on Simmons Ave near the Village Clerk's Office.

Peebles is a village in the Sinking Spring Section of the Buckeye Trail and is nestled in the Appalachian Foothills of Ohio. This is the first Trail Town for the Appalachian Foothills Chapter of the BTA.

Peebles is home to the National Landmark site of The Great Serpent Mound. The Great Serpent Mound is a 1,348-feet-long (411 m), three-feet-high prehistoric effigy mound. The mound is the largest serpent effigy known in the world.

The village was platted in 1881 by Isaiah Custer at the junction of Zane's Trace and the Cincinnati & Eastern Railway, and named after John G Peebles, who was instrumental in bringing the railroad to the settlement. The village was incorporated in 1886.
